STRAIGHT UP...

"I will make them and the places all around My hill a blessing; and I will cause showers to come down in their season; there shall be showers of blessing."

Ezekiel 34: 26

In declaring God's message, the prophet Ezekiel was certainly speaking of natural rain when he faithfully reported the word he had received. God was preparing to send showers upon the earth. He would water the land that it

might prosper — that it might increase, producing fruit leading to an abundant harvest. And yet, there is more here than a weather report.

Yes, God was preparing to send "showers of blessing" upon the earth, but He was also preparing to send "showers of blessing" into the lives of His people. The showers were symbolic of more than rains that water the earth. While they spoke of that beautiful and timely resource, God also wants to bring "showers of blessing" into the lives of His people. He wants to pour Himself out upon them through the fullness of His Spirit that they might be fruitful and produce an abundant harvest of righteousness that brings glory to His name.

The keyword in this isn't "blessing," but "showers." God is a God of abundance and He is not reticent to share, withholding a portion of His goodness and grace. Rather, He pours Himself out upon those who seek Him: a profusion of blessing; an overwhelming, extravagance of His mercy and love.

We all experience seasons of drought, but that is not God's desire for His people. Rather, He desires that we know Him, that we experience His presence as a refreshing rain that replenishes, restores, cleanses, nourishes, and (ultimately) leads to abundant fruit. He desires that we not just be filled, but overflow, with His Spirit, abounding in Him. So, we are called to be sensitive to the Spirit — tender toward the Spirit. For, it is the Person of the Holy Spirit that empowers us, directs us, grants us understanding, gifts/equips us, and works in and through us that we might bear fruit worthy of Christ's name.

Will you embrace today the joy (and privilege) of being the dwelling place of the Holy Spirit? Will you turn your eyes toward heaven and open your heart and life to experience the "showers of blessing" God has for you: The beautiful, extravagant, abundance of the Spirit of the living God?

HMC Library News:

Hearts of Fire by The Voice of the Martyrs [Jesus Freaks]

These are stories of eight brave women of the under ground Christian church who suffered much for their faith. I will attempt to tell you about two of them.

Adel of Indonesia: Adel was married to Mathu at age 17 and had two children soon thereafter. Nearly all of the families in Adel's village were Christian. But the Muslins started Jihad [Holy Wars]. They burned done the whole village and took many hostage and killed many others. However Adel survived as a hostage and later her daughter was also found as a hostage. Her captors tried to get information as to the whereabouts of other Christians that got away but Adel would not reveal any names. Her captors forced her to marry another man and another child was born by Adel and they named her Sarah. Adel and Sarah were able to escape from her captors and second husband and met up with her first husband and took up family life again including their older daughter. But they constantly had be on the lookout from her second husband who was constantly looking for them. Latter when Adel and Methu were interviewed for this story they were both studying in a secret bible school.

Purnima was about 10 years of age living with her family of ten. They lived in Bhutan which is a Buddhist country. Purnima had an older married sister named Maya who became very sick and could not be healed even though her father was the local witch doctor. There was no healing for at least 3 yrs. and more. Then one day she was healed and Maya claimed that Jesus healed her. Her parents were happy that their daughter was well again but could not accept that Jesus healed her. Maya and her husband Sival had become Christians and believed that Jesus could and would heal Maya. When they told their parents that they had accepted Christianity they were forced out of their family home even that same day. They took up life outside a neighboring village. No one was to visit them. But Purnima went over there any way and also accepted the faith and chased from her home. Purnima moved in with her sister's family. About a year later arrests started on Christmas Day 1992. They were interrogated for 10 weeks, slapping and beating in a large detention center. Finally all the Christians had to leave Bhutan. They arrived at a refugee camp outside Nepal. Conditions were appalling. Purnima with some others of their group slipped out of the refugee camp to do some witnessing and were caught by the authorities and imprisoned. After very much torture and mistreatment they were sentenced to six years in prison. But the outside world got to hear of this other countries put on pressure to get these prisoners released. After 14 months and 6 days the Christians were released. Many other cellmates became Christians. Purnima, Sliva, Maya still live in this refugee camp at the writing of this book.

These stories are so interesting, I could not put the book down until the end of each story.

Hello Everyone – I wanted to give you all an update on how things are going in Jackson with the Service Adventure unit. It's been a very challenging time as participants have been grieving the loss of Hannah [who died in a car accident]. A couple of the participants have gone home to give themselves some space for grieving. We are unsure whether or not they will return. And two still remain in Jackson. Renee Neufeld has agreed to move from Anchorage to Jackson to complete the year as the unit leader. Renee was the leader in Anchorage for the past three years and will be a great resource to the participants and congregation as they continue to walk through this incredibly difficult time. The services for Hannah will be this Saturday. Caleb [another service worker who was also in the accident] was released from the hospital last Thursday and is recovering in Goshen at his parent's home. Please keep everyone in your prayers.

Some of you have asked if there is anything that the Jackson unit needs or ways that you can be helpful. We have set up an account where people can give financially if they would like. The funds we receive will help get the participants and some of the support committee and host families from Open Door Mennonite Church in Jackson to Goshen for the funeral this weekend. One of the other ways we may use funds (if enough is received) is helping to pay for Renee's transition to Anchorage. And helping to send Hannah and Caleb's personal property back to Goshen.
