

VBS Reflections

I had not been a part of VBS since my Sophomore year in university, so I was a little nervous when I volunteered for whatever role was needed for our week together at the beginning of June. I ended up leading our bible adventure time each day, exploring the passages in Acts that exemplified each day's theme.

Jesus' power helps us do hard things stuck with me from our time together. Sometimes God calls us to the uncomfortable or unknown spaces, to which we are afraid to go like Freeman, SD from Illinois or being involved in VBS even when it seems like a stretch. Sometimes God leads us to talking to a neighbor or inviting a friend over for dinner or calling someone. God gives us the power through the Holy Spirit to do these difficult and stretching actions. I contend that God gives new life or breath or Spirit each and every day to do the bold things that Jesus inspires in us but that we are too afraid or busy to attempt.

On the fourth day, two particular moments in VBS were quite moving for me during bible adventure time. I told the students about how God created each one of us just as God created the first human beings in the garden of Eden. God created us to be together with other people and with God's creation as well as together with God walking through the garden. God loves each of us so much and wants to be our friend, so I took a moment and walked around each group of students, calling each student by name and saying, "God made you and loves you very much." We, even as adults, could use some encouragement like this when we're not sure of the way forward or sure if anyone cares for us. We can depend on God's steadfast love.

However, humans decided in the garden that their way was better than God's, that they knew better than God did in this created world, which led them to hurt each other, hurt God, hurt creation, and hurt themselves. How often we think and tell children that adults' ways of doing things are better than children's ways, and by extension, we get a little too comfortable in our ways of doing things, leading us to say implicitly that our ways are better than Jesus' way even sometimes. How often then do we hurt each other in our assurance that our way is the best. Dear God, through the Spirit's power, inspire your way in us each and every moment.

Some other highlights of VBS week that brought me joy and encouragement included playing duck-duck-goose with the younger group of children, getting to know most of the children in our church by more than their name, and having the chance for them to know me better. In the same ways that I got to know each of the kids better, I was able to connect in different moments throughout the week with the leaders and volunteers of our time together. Even in the shadow of COVID, our time together, at least for me, was fruitful and life-giving.





HYMN OF THE MONTH

This month's hymn, Paul Hofer has chosen "One Day at a Time" as his favorite hymn. Paul said, "Every day when you get up you just praise your Lord and take the day as it comes. Today is today. Tomorrow is its own time."

"One Day at a Time" is a gospel hymn that was born out of heartache and misery. In 1974, a 53-year old song writer and music publisher, Marijohn Wilkin, went to a minister to unload her burdens. Both she and her husband suffered from alcoholism and her marriage was on the rocks. A business partner, a close friend, and her mother had all recently passed away, and money owed to her was not being paid. Things seemed as bad as they could be. The minister gave her unusual advice. He told her to thank God for her problems. While driving home. She followed his advice and soon tears led to laughter. When she got home, she sat down at the piano, and on the back of an envelope wrote the first verse and chorus of "One Day at a Time." Later, she reflected that the song was a cry for help—a prayer.

Marijohn called her friend, Kris Kristofferson, and they finished the song together. "One Day at a Time" became a gospel standard. It has been recorded over 200 times and recognized as one of the "Fifty All Time Most Important Southern Gospel Songs."

Jerome E. Kleinsasser was born to Joe D. and Anna Hofer Kleinsasser on September 20, 1936 in Marion, South Dakota.


Jerome was baptized on May 27, 1951 and became a member of Hutterthal Mennonite Church.

While the Library Committee works, at least for the most part, 'behind the scenes', they are a part of Hutterthal that works to serve you, our church family. Our efforts provide you with reading material, both for study and inspiration as well as for leisure enjoyment.

The 2021 library committee consists of Joline Thomas (representing Congregational Ministries), Rebecca Hofer and Kylea Waltner (representing the Children's Sunday School Department), Norman Hofer (our elected at-large member) and Charlene Friesen (librarian).

Our library is organized by genre and subject. The shelves are labeled for easy searching but you are welcome to ask our librarian any time for help finding a particular book or item. She takes great delight in successfully finding just what you are looking for. Section topics are Biography, Christian Life, Family Life, Fiction, Issues, Local History, Mennonite History, Missions, and Theology. We also have a wide selection of dvd/study books, dvds (both children and adult) and some cds for your listening pleasure. To purchase these items, we get a designated amount of funding each year from the general church treasury. But we also accept donations with the committee's approval.


Next to children's books, the most checked out books are biographies and fiction books. If you have a suggestion for any book, particularly a good biography, let one of the committee know. People enjoy reading stories of the true experiences of real people, as well as just escaping in a good fiction book.

We do have the complete set of Believers Church Bible Commentaries. We acquire the new titles as they are printed, generally every year. I and II Kings by Lynn Jost will be printed in 2021. Our library also contains many other individual books for study, often shelved by theme or issue. Bible encyclopedias, a variety of Bible versions and multiple copies of the Bible can be found on our shelves.

The children's section contains many excellent books, both fiction and non-fiction. The National Geographic Face to Face animal books are a big hit with some boys from Hutterthal!

Our church has encouraged our children to participate in the CPMC Shalom Book Reading Program. This program encourages children to read specific books on a Shalom list. The children are then rewarded with a free book. Our library has a special shelf with books on the Shalom reading list for easy access. These books are a wonderful mission, teaching our children principles of Shalom.

People had to know how old they were —how else would we know how old Methuselah was? The date had to be significant enough, and plausibly, a celebration would help one to remember.

Genesis 5: 25-27 When Methuselah had lived 187 years, he became the Father of Lamech. And after he became the father of Lamech, Methuselah lived 782 years and had other sons and daughters. Altogether, Methuselah lived 969 years, and then he died.
