Hearing the Story

We tell stories a lot. When we get home from work for the day, when we sit with friends around the table, and even when we gather for church each week on Sunday mornings. The books of the Bible are each their own story within the unfolding much larger story of God calling human beings to be who God had created them to be.

The past two weeks, I took a seminary class called Biblical Storytelling, in which several classmates and I explored with our professor the story of Jesus as told in the gospel of Mark. One of the big takeaways from our time together was that these books of the old and new testament, or the Hebrew and Greek scriptures, would have almost always been heard by audiences, not read. Reading the scriptures is a relatively new thing within the life of the church, and even in the ancient world of the Hebrew people before exile, only priests and scribes might have been functionally literate enough to read from the scrolls that we know now as the writings of the Hebrew scriptures.


Yet, even in our worship services and our gatherings, we often read the words of scripture rather then telling them to those gathered around us as the stories that they are. Next time that you are reading your Bible, take a moment to imagine what it would have been like to only have ever heard someone speak this particular piece of scripture around a table or a fire in the evening. Then if you're feeling really brave, try telling the story to someone and see what changes about the particular scripture as you learn to tell it.

Disarmed: The Radical Life and Legacy of Michael "MJ" Sharp

The story of a Mennonite PK (preacher's kid) who was murdered at the age of 34 in Democratic Republic of Congo doing what he loved best. Michael was a rambunctious boy, with a lot of energy and spunk. He was a mischievous teenager. One of his college pranks is still talked about to this day.

Studies came easy to Michael. He loved electronics, adventures, world travel, different languages, poker cards, computers and challenges. He took his last semester at Bethany Christian High School at Goshen, Indiana to live in Costa Rica, with his missionary uncle and Aunt, David & Pat Sharp to learn about indigenous tribes in the jungle. He graduated from Goshen College and got his masters degree from Marburg University, Germany.

Michael accepted an assignment in 2012 with Mennonite Central Committee serving in Rwanda/Burundi & eastern Congo, working with food distribution and teaching agriculture. This area has been the scene of tribal warfare for decades. Thousands of their people have been killed. Families have starved to death because of tribal battles in this area.

Michael's passion was "Why does the human race have wars, why are we always killing each other"? There has to be a different way! He was fearless as he traveled unarmed, back and forth among the militant tribes, learned their languages, hearing their stories and living with them in a simple lifestyle, trying to settle disagreements and wars. When asked if this is dangerous, his reply was "All of life has its risks".

The United Nations learned about his work and success in this area. He was hired by the UN in 2015 to be part of "Group of Experts" trying to bring peace to this area. It was on one of these travels back and forth that Michael Sharp and Zaida Catalan of Sweden, both UN workers, disappeared.

Their bodies were found days later, both with gunshot wounds, and Zaida was beheaded, both buried in shallow graves.

Five years later the mystery of who murdered these two UN workers is still not solved. When Michael's father, Rev. John Sharp, was asked what justice he wants for his son's murder he replied "I don't want revenge or justice, let the perpetrators be sentenced to 20 years of walking through the forest unarmed to serve internally displaced people carrying water and digging latrines".

For Rebecca Hofer, several hymns have been meaningful to her throughout her life. From a camp song she learned as a teenager at Eagle Lake Christian Camp, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing, and Be Thou my Vision, where she even enjoys the rock version or "my own slightly off key version." Recently, another hymn has been especially dear to her. Rebecca said, "His Eye is on the Sparrow has always been a song that has touched me and reminded me of how He watches out for us, me specifically, and now my children and my husband. After He guided us all safely through that derecho, I constantly have tears in my eyes at that thought that He kept us safe and His eyes were on these sparrows."

Written in 1904 by Civilla D. Martin from Canada, the lyrics are inspired by Matthew 10:29--31. "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted. So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows." Civilla and her husband had developed a deep friendship with a couple by the name of Mr. and Mrs. Doolittle. Mrs. Doolittle had been bedridden for 20 years and her husband was crippled, having to propel himself to and from his business in a wheel chair. Civilla said, "Despite their afflictions, they lived happy Christian lives, bringing inspiration and comfort to all who knew them." One day, when asked what was their secret to such hopefulness, Mrs. Doolittle replied, "His eye is on the sparrow, and I know he watches me." Inspired, Civilla wrote the lyrics and sent them to Charles H Gabriel to write music.


Whenever I am tempted, whenever clouds arise,
